The History of the Tucson Desert Song Festival

Tucson has a long tradition of classical music leadership in the Southwest. The University of Arizona has offered instruction in music since the late 1800s, and the Tucson Symphony Orchestra is the oldest continuing professional performing arts organization in Arizona. With these and other artistic partners as a foundation, the Tucson Desert Song Festival was formed in 2010 as a Section 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation by a group of music-loving volunteers.

The driving force behind the festival was Jack Forsythe. Under Jack's leadership, TDSF was founded to coordinate, subsidize, and publicize a unique classical voice festival highlighting Tucson's rich musical tradition with the aim of bringing to Tucson internationally renowned vocal performers to celebrate and advance vocal music as an art form

A Vision Realized

Throughout the winter and spring of 2025, the Tucson Desert Song Festival will present its 13th festival, showcasing, in collaboration with our performing partners, one of the widest array of world-class vocal performers since the festival's inception.

Clearly, Jack Forsythe's vision has been realized, enriching Tucson's cultural life in a way that will impact our community for generations to come. The arts are indispensable to who we are as a society. They inspire beauty, kindle new ideas, reveal new truths, and bind us together.

SeokJong Baek continues to draw international praise for his arresting lirico/spinto sound and refined technical accomplishment. Baek's critically acclaimed debut as Samson in Saint-Saëns's Samson et Dalila at the Royal Opera House was not only a house and role debut but

also his professional debut as a tenor, having transitioned from baritone. Back made a number of major debuts last season, including a much-anticipated Metropolitan Opera debut as Ismaele in *Nabucco*.



Hailed as an artist "alight with the spirit of the music" (Boston Globe), three-time GRAMMY Award-winning bass-baritone Dashon Burton has established a vibrant career appearing regularly throughout the US and Europe, performing Baroque to contemporary repertoire. He received

two of his GRAMMY Awards for recordings with the groundbreaking vocal ensemble Roomful of Teeth, of which he is an original member.



Baritone Kidon Choi is a recent graduate of the prestigious Lindemann Young Artist Program at The Metropolitan Opera. While in the program, he was seen as José Castro in La fanciulla del West, Herald in Otello, and Prince Yamadori in Madama Butterfly. Last season, Choi made his debut with San Diego Opera in Madama

Butterfly as Sharpless and joined the roster of the Lyric Opera of Chicago for Aida.



American composer John
Corigliano continues to add to one of the richest, most unusual, and most widely celebrated bodies of work created over the last forty years. Corigliano's scores, now numbering over one hundred, have won the Pulitzer Prize, the Grawemeyer Award, five GRAMMY Awards, an Academy Award, and have been

performed and recorded by many of the most prominent orchestras, soloists, and chamber musicians in the world.



With a career spanning almost four decades, world-renowned violinist **Joshua Bell** is one of the most celebrated artists of his era. Bell has performed with virtually every major orchestra in the world and maintains engagements as a soloist, chamber musician, conductor, and as the Music Director of

the Academy of St Martin in the Fields in London. He has recorded over 40 albums, garnering GRAMMY, Mercury, and Gramophone awards and has collaborated with leading artists across almost every genre.



Jennifer Johnson Cano has garnered critical acclaim for performances of both new and standard repertoire, lauded by the New York Times for her "rich-toned mezzo-soprano" voice and by Opera News as a "matchless interpreter of contemporary opera." She has appeared in more than 100

performances on the stage at The Metropolitan Opera since her debut in the 2009-2010 season, most recently in the roles of Nicklausse, Emilia, Hansel, and Meg Page.



Two-time GRAMMY Award-winning mezzo-soprano

Sasha Cooke has been called a "luminous standour" by the New York Times and "equal parts poise, radiance, and elegant directness" by Opera News. Ms. Cooke has sung at the Metropolitan Opera, San Francisco Opera, English

National Opera, and Opéra National de Bordeaux, among others, and with over 80 symphonies worldwide. 2022 marked Ms. Cooke's appointment as Co-Director of the Lehrer Vocal Institute.



Stephen Costello has been hailed as "a prodigiously gifted singer whose voice makes an immediate impact" (Associated Press). The Philadelphia-born tenor quickly established a reputation as a "first-class talent" (Opera News) after coming to national attention in 2007 when, aged 26, he made

his Metropolitan Opera debut. Two years later, Stephen won the prestigious Richard Tucker Award, and he has since appeared at many of the world's most important opera houses and music festivals.



Mezzo-soprano Kristin Dauphinais is highly regarded for her artistry and versatility. She has worked in a variety of genres including musical theater, opera, concert, oratorio, chamber music, and solo recitals. Her performing career has taken her throughout the United

States as well on tours in Italy, China, and Australia with additional concert performances in Germany, Spain, Austria, and Luxembourg. Dr. Dauphinais is the chair of vocal studies at the University of Arizona.



Since 1975, pianist, composer, and Fulbright Scholar Armen Donelian has distinguished himself in 25 countries as a featured solo pianist, band leader, and educator. Donelian's distinctive music blends diverse influences from his Armenian origin, classical technique, and his association with many of the

biggest names in jazz. According to *Metronome* magazine, "he achieves this fusion in such a natural way that one can tell it's a master's work."



As the founder of the internationally renowned Native Women's a cappella trio, Ulali, Tuscarora/
Taíno musician **Pura Fé** has been a driving force in building a bridge for Native music into the mainstream music scene. Her numerous awards include Best World Album from L'Académie Charles Cros in 2006 and most recently the Dora Mayor

Moore Award for Outstanding Music Composition and Sound Design for *Miigis: Underwater Panther*, an interdisciplinary piece that received performances across the globe in 2023.



American soprano Amanda
Forsythe, celebrated for her
performances on both sides of
the Atlantic, is a regular soloist
with highly acclaimed baroque
ensembles, symphonies, and
leading opera companies and music
festivals. Forsythe is a frequent
performer with the Boston Early
Music Festival, where her many

roles have included Poppea in *L'incoronazione di Poppea*, Eolie in *Desmarest's Circé*, Angelica in *Orlando*, and Serpina in *La serva padrona*.



Born in Hermosillo, Sonora, Misael Barraza-Díaz is one of the most outstanding Mexican guitarists of his generation. He has received 10 first places in international competitions and has performed as a soloist throughout the United States, Mexico, Canada, and Europe. During the summer

of 2019, Misael was part of the prestigious European tour organized by EuroStrings with a cast of artists made up only of guitarists who won first places in important European competitions.

Acclaimed by the New York Classical Review as "a vision of sunshine and joy," possessing a "lovely lyric soprano," Ashley Fabian is quickly garnering recognition for her artistry in both comedic and dramatic roles. Ms. Fabian was a three-time Regional Finalist in the Metropolitan Opera Laffont

Competition and appears regularly throughout the United States on both the opera and concert stage.



London-born **Nigel Foster** studied piano at the Royal Academy of Music where his teachers were Roger Vignoles, Graham Johnson, and Iain Burnside. At the Academy, he won every prize and award available for piano accompaniment and has since been appointed an Associate

Professor of the Royal Academy of Music. Nigel is also the founder and director of the London Song Festival, an annual event promoting song repertoire. Nigel enjoys a busy schedule performing on the concert platform worldwide.



The Venezuelan-born, Spanish conductor **José Luis Gomez** began his musical career as a violinist but was catapulted to international attention when he won first prize in the 2010 International Sir Georg Solti Conductor's Competition in Frankfurt, Germany, securing a sensational and rare

unanimous decision from the jury. In 2016, he was named Music Director of the Tucson Symphony Orchestra.



Named "the real showstopper" by the New York Times, three time GRAMMY Awardwinning bass-baritone Ryan Speedo Green has quickly established himself as an artist of international demand at the world's leading opera houses. Honors and awards include National Grand Finals

Winner of the 2011 Metropolitan Opera National Council Auditions, a 2014 George London Foundation Award, and both the Richard and Sara Tucker Grants.



George Hanson brings many years of experience in the symphonic world to his current position as Executive Director of the Alexandria Symphony. After several decades of an active conducting career throughout the United States and Europe, Hanson turned his attention to management and administration and served

as Festival Director/Coordinator of the Tucson Desert Song Festival from 2015 to 2024. His career includes 19 years as Music Director of the Tucson Symphony Orchestra.



Conductor Eric Holtan, the founding music director of True Concord Voices & Orchestra, previously served as associate conductor of the Southern Arizona Symphony Orchestra and as the assistant director of the Tucson Symphony Orchestra Chorus. He continues his work in church music, which he began as an

organist at age 12, as minister of music, art, and liturgy at Dove of Peace Lutheran Church.



Praised for her "soaring vocal range and the depth of her acting" (Broadway World),

Caitlin Gotimer made her European debut in the summer of 2024 as Donna Anna in Don Giovanni with Deutsche Oper Berlin and also made her debut as the Countess in The Marriage of

Figaro at the Aspen Music Festival. In the 2024/25 season, Gotimer debuts in *Il Pagliacci* (Nedda) with Pittsburgh Opera and *La Bohème* (Mimì) with Arizona Opera.



Caity Gyorgy is a two-time JUNO award-winning Canadian vocalist known for singing bebop and swing music. She has performed at jazz clubs and festivals across Canada, Mexico, Japan, and the USA and has worked and recorded with many of today's leading jazz musicians. In addition to

performing, Caity is an avid songwriter. Her compositions have won multiple awards, including Grand Prize in the jazz category of the 2021 John Lennon Songwriting Contest.



A native of Philadelphia, soprano **Leah Hawkins** is the 2024 recipient of the Beverly Sills Artist Award from the Metropolitan Opera. She begins the 2024-25 season in recital at the Park Avenue Armory, followed by several concert appearances in New York City. Later this season,

she debuts with the San Francisco Symphony in Verdi's *Messa da Requiem*, returns to Arizona Opera for her role debut as *Aida*, and returns to the Philadelphia Orchestra for Beethoven's 9th Symphony.



Japanese-born choreographer Chieko Imada, assistant artistic director of Ballet Tucson, has danced professionally with companies including Inoue Ballet of Tokyo and Ballet Arizona. She has staged many classical ballets and has also created numerous original

contemporary works during her more than three decades with Ballet Tucson. She also appeared regularly with the Orts Theatre of Dance and Tenth St. Danceworks modern troupes in Tucson.



Pianist and coach **Anthony Manoli** has worked with
many leading opera companies
throughout the world, both as
